

Information on counterfeits withdrawn from circulation in 2023

In 2023, the Croatian National Bank recorded 4,920 counterfeit euro banknotes with a nominal value of EUR 301,015.00 and 3,962 counterfeit euro coins with a nominal value of EUR 7,760.00. The following table shows data on withdrawn and recorded counterfeit euro banknotes in 2023, broken down by denomination and share.

In addition, 33 counterfeit kuna banknotes, 182 counterfeit US dollar banknotes, seven counterfeit pound sterling banknotes and six counterfeit Australian dollar banknotes were registered in the period from January to December 2023.


In order to educate individuals who handle cash on a daily basis and the general public about cash, the Croatian National Bank carries out the National Training Programme on Euro Banknote and Coin Authentication. The training contents and schedule are adjusted to the target groups and the training is conducted at several levels. The objective of the training is the acquiring of knowledge on the security features of euro banknotes and coins in order to successfully check their authenticity and prevent the receipt of counterfeit cash as authentic.

The euro training intended for the public and retailers is accessible at the website <u>Euro edukacija</u> free of charge, no registration required.

Most counterfeit euro banknotes are quickly and easily identified by using the <u>feel, look and tilt</u> method.


The description and images of genuine and counterfeit banknotes are presented below, where genuine banknotes are framed in green and counterfeits in red. In the observed period, 50 euro banknotes of the Europa series accounted for the largest number of counterfeit euro banknotes withdrawn from circulation. They are easy to detect by checking the following security feature:

The obverse side of the genuine banknote features an emerald number in the bottom-left corner. By tilting the banknote, the number changes colour from emerald green to deep blue and displays an effect of the light that moves up and down the number. The imitation of the emerald number on the counterfeit does not change colour when the banknote is tilted.



Counterfeit 100 euro banknotes of the first series are also frequent. They are easy to detect by checking at least two of their security features:


By looking through the **hologram** in the bottom-right corner of the genuine banknote and tilting the banknote, you can see the change between the nominal value symbol and the architectural motif and rainbow-coloured concentric circles moving on the hologram surface. When the counterfeit banknote shown below is tilted, the nominal value symbol and the architectural motif do not change and the hologram's rainbow-coloured concentric circles do not move on the hologram imitation.



- The reverse of the genuine banknote displays **optically variable ink** that changes colour from purple to olive-green or brown when the banknote is tilted. On the counterfeit banknote, the imitation of this security feature does not have the effect of a change of colour when the viewing angle is changed.



Suspect banknotes and coins can be submitted to the Croatian National Bank for analysis, personally or by post, with the <u>Application for technical analysis</u> available on the Croatian National Bank's website.
